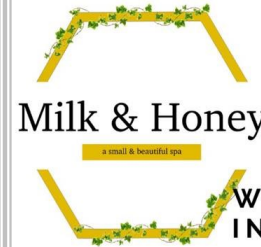

**The 5 Step Guide to entering the show**

1. Read through the class descriptions and show rules and select the class you would like to enter. For example, you might be a keen baker (see domestic cookery pg 13) or photographer (pg 17) or maybe you're growing a huge marrow! (class 21, pg 10). You can enter as many different classes as you like, but some classes have maximum entries per class, and this will be shown in the schedule.
2. Go to the form on pg 19 of the schedule, or you can use the form on the website ([www.sturtonandstowshow.com](http://www.sturtonandstowshow.com)). Copies are also available from the Show secretary. Enter details for the class number you are entering, and entry fee (25p per entry, children enter free). Please include a total of all entry fees in the space below the table.
3. Entry forms must be sent either by post (address on form) or email ([sturtonandstowshow@gmail.com](mailto:sturtonandstowshow@gmail.com)) to arrive by Thursday 5<sup>th</sup> October. Entry forms can also be submitted, and fees paid, in person 6.30pm-8.30pm on Wednesday 4<sup>th</sup> October (Sturton by Stow Village Hall).  
**Sorry, no entry forms can be accepted on the day of the show!!!**
4. The next step is to place your exhibit in the correct position at the show. This can be done the evening before (8.00pm-8.45pm) or the morning of the show (7.30-10am). You will need your entry card, which was given to you if you entered in person at the village hall, or it can be collected at the show venue if you entered by email or post. If entering a children's class that stipulates "age to be stated" please add the child's age to the entry card. There will be stewards and committee members around to help with this. **Remember to double check the rules for your class, as any entries not compliant cannot be judged!**
5. Sit back relax and enjoy the show. Judging will have been completed by the time the show opens at 1.30pm, so you can return to your entry to see how you, and friends and family, have done. Prize cards will be placed by your entry as applicable. Prizes can be collected from show at 4.30pm (please bring your prize cards).

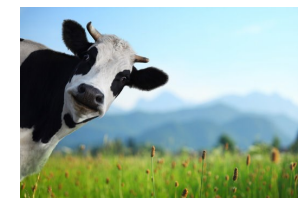

## Show Recipes



### Gingerbread Cake (Class 126)



#### Ingredients-

225g Plain Flour, Pinch of Salt, 2 x teaspoons Ground Ginger, 1 x teaspoon Mixed Spice, 1 x teaspoon Bicarbonate of Soda, 50g Soft Dark Brown Sugar 100g Margarine, 175g Black Treacle, 50g Golden Syrup, 150ml Milk, 2 medium eggs beaten

1 teaspoon = 5ml

#### Method-

Heat oven to 150c, 300f, gas mark 2. Grease and line an 18cm square deep cake tin.

Sieve together flour, salt, ginger, spice & bicarb. Stir in sugar.

Melt margarine, treacle, syrup together slowly. Gradually beat in the milk and allow to cool.

Add the beaten eggs and mix well. Stir treacle mixture into the flour and mix well until all the flour is combined.

Pour mixture into the prepared tin and bake for approximately 1hour 15 mins. Allow to cool.

### Banana & Chocolate Muffins (Class 146)



#### Ingredients-

100g Margarine, 2 Eggs (beaten), 175g Caster Sugar, 230g Self Raising Flour, 1 teaspoon Baking Powder, 3 tablespoons Milk, 2 Bananas (very ripe & mashed), 100g Dark Chocolate Chips.

1 teaspoon= 5ml

#### Method-

Preheat oven to 180c, fan 160c, gas mark 4. Line a 12 hole muffin tin with paper cases. Mix together margarine, sugar, flour, baking powder, milk & eggs until smooth. Add mashed banana & chocolate chips.

Spoon mixture evenly into the paper cases and bake for approximately 25 minutes or until a skewer comes out clean. The muffins should be a golden brown colour. Allow to cool.

## OBJECTS AND RULES OF THE ASSOCIATION (CONT)

(10) Exhibitors are allowed any number of entries in each Class except where stated, but can take only one money prize. Exhibits displayed without Entry Tickets are disqualified.

(11) Only Exhibitors and Officials will be allowed access to Exhibits before the opening of the Show.

(12) The Association will not be responsible for loss of or damage done to any exhibit.

(13) Entry Fee for all classes 25p per Exhibit except Children's classes (Free).

(14) The First prize in any class may not necessarily be awarded unless there are at least 2 exhibits, the Second prize unless there are at least 3 exhibits, the Third prize unless there are at least 4 exhibits. A Highly Commended award may be given to the fourth best exhibit at the Judge's discretion.

(15) The Show will be open from 1.30 pm to 4.30 pm and no exhibit may be removed until 4.30 pm without permission, but all exhibits not for sale to be removed by 5.00 pm Any exhibits remaining after 5.00 pm will be deemed to be the property of the Show and will be offered for sale, unless notified otherwise.

(16) Admission: Vice-Presidents Free (by badge). Adults £1 each. Children 30p each.

(17) No dogs, except guide dogs, shall be allowed in the Exhibition.

(18) Any Exhibitor making an objection must deposit £5.00 with the Secretary, and this shall be returned if the objection is sustained; the deposit shall not be necessary if the objector is a member of the committee.

(19) All entries will be accepted at the Village Hall on the Wednesday 4th October from 6.30 pm to 8.30pm, or they may be received by post or email (including entry fees) on or before Thursday 5th October.

(20) Prize money will be paid out by the Treasurer at the Show from 4.30 pm to 5.30 pm on Show Day. All prize money not claimed by 31<sup>st</sup> October 2023 to revert to the funds of the Association.

(21) Children who were at Primary School until the end of Summer Term in the Show year may enter the 11 to 12 year classes. All such entries are to show the age of the Exhibitor at the time the Exhibit was made.

(22) Persons wilfully infringing the Rules shall forfeit any prize money awarded to them. In all disputes, the decision of the Committee is final.

## STURTON AND STOW AGRICULTURAL AND HORTICULTURAL ASSOCIATION OBJECTS AND RULES OF THE ASSOCIATION

(1) The association shall endeavour to promote and foster interests in Agriculture and Horticulture, in Sturton, Stow and the surrounding district and shall stage shows for this purpose consisting mainly of open competitive classes. In addition, the Association shall include in its shows such Domestic Science, Arts and Crafts classes beneficial educationally to the competitors and the community.

(2) No distribution of funds shall be made to members, except prize money, and in the event of the dissolution of the Association the members shall have no right to share in the Accumulated Fund but shall apply the Association's assets to such a charitable purpose or purposes as may be agreed.

(3) The Annual General Meeting of the Association shall be open to the public and all subscribers.

(4) All subscribers of £3.00 and above are to be VICE-PRESIDENTS and subscribers of £25.00 and above are to be LIFE VICE-PRESIDENTS. Where 2 persons from the same residence wish to be Vice-Presidents the fee shall be £5.00 for the couple.

(5) Rules 1 to 4 inclusive shall be altered only in Annual General Meetings of the Association but no alteration, variation or addition may be made to the Rules which would make the objects or assets of the association not exclusively charitable or the assets of the association applicable otherwise than for exclusively charitable purposes.

### SHOW RULES

(6) Root and Combinable Classes are OPEN. Produce, Flowers and Cacti Classes are OPEN to ANYONE not employing a full-time gardener. Classes in all other sections are OPEN to ANYONE not being a professional in the art or craft of that section, unless otherwise stated.

(7) All Exhibits, except in the Floral Art Section, must have been grown by or be the original work of the Exhibitor. Cacti and Window Plants must have been grown by or have been in the possession of the Exhibitor for at least three calendar months.

(8) No prize-winning Exhibits at previous shows of this Association are eligible for competition in Classes 142-205.

(9) All specimens for exhibition must be staged between 7.30-10 am on the morning of the Show or between 8.00-8.45 pm on the Friday evening before the Show. Vases and containers should be provided by the Exhibitors.
